- # 1 **precarious** (adj) dangerous and uncertain ( safe and secure)

  Driving very fast when the roads are covered with ice and snow is putting the driver and passengers in a **precarious** situation.
- # 2 **optimistic** (adj) looking on the bright side, expecting the best (# pessimistic)

Since I am **optimistic** about the chances for good weather - this weekend, I am planning a big outdoor barbeque.

# 3 **pessimistic** (adj) - looking on the dark side, expecting the worst (# optimistic)

I was <u>pessimistic</u> about passing the test because I hadn't studied the difficult material.

- # 4 **ludicrous** (adj) silly, ridiculous (opp. serious, sensible)

  He wore a **ludicrous** revolving hat with kitchen utensiles dangling from the brim.
- # 5 **tepid** (adj) lukewarm, slightly warm

  Be sure to bathe the baby in **tepid** water so he won't get too chilly or be burned.
- # 6 **ostentatious** (adj.) showy, flashy (\def modest, private)

  If you travel alone at night in the subway, dressed in an **ostentatious** manner wearing lots of jewelry and an expensive fur coat, you are likely to get robbed.
- # 7 **loiter** (verb) to hang around, to linger wasting time Alicia and Jessica **loitered** along the street looking in the shop windows waiting for their mother to pick them up.
- # 8 **affluent** (adj) very rich, wealthy ( † very poor, destitute)

  The real estate agent didn't show us homes in the Gold

  Coast because she knew we weren't **affluent** enough to live in that luxurious neighborhood.
- # 9 **elated** (adj) extremely happy, full of joy ( † depressed, despondent)
  The parents were **elated** when their kidnapped son was returned home safe and sound.
- # 10 **former** (adj) 1) the first of two things mentioned 2) earlier; past 1) When I'm offered ice cream or pie, I always choose the **former**. 2) In **former** times, cooking was always done in fireplaces instead of stoves.
- # 11 latter (adj) 1) the second of two things mentioned 2) nearer the end (= former)

1) Canada and the United States are in North America; the former lies north of the <u>latter</u>.

2) The year 1999 is in the <u>latter</u> part of the 20th Century.

# 12 **destitute** (adj) extremely poor; lacking the necessities to survive (‡ affluent)

The <u>destitute</u> families who lost everything in the earthquake in Turkey will depend on outside support for a long time.

# 13 despondent (adj) extremely sad, depressed (‡ elated)

Many people in North Carolina felt <u>despondent</u> after Hurricane Floyd totally destroyed their homes and killed members of their families.

# 14 **inferior** (adj) of poor quality (noun) person of lower rank (\ddg) superior)

1. The <u>inferior</u> T-shirt shrank, ripped at the seams and faded the first time it was washed.

2. The boss spoke harshly to his <u>inferiors</u> and expected them to obey his orders immediately and without question.

# 15 superior (adj) of excellent quality (noun) person of higher rank, the boss

1. We were willing to pay a higher price for a <u>superior</u> car believing it would last longer and give better performance.

2. All members of the armed forces are required to salute their **superior** officers.

# 16 **fleet** (adj) very fast (noun) a group of vehicles under one command (‡ slow moving)

1. The cheetah is the most <u>fleet</u> land animal in the world.

2. My uncle owns a limousine company and parks his **fleet** of limousines in a huge garage on Tenth Avenue.

# 17 ominous (adj) threatening looking

The <u>ominous</u> clouds in the sky led us to believe a severe storm was approaching.

# 18 significant (adj) important (= trivial)

When taking notes, students should include only the most **significant** details.

# 19 **trivial** (adj) unimportant, insignificant (= significant)

During the emergency, citizens were asked not to tie up phone lines for **trivial** conversations; the lines had to be kept open for urgent communications.

# 20 minute (adj and noun) 1) tiny, very small (‡ immense, huge, enormous) 2) a short unit of time, 60 seconds

1) The legs of the flea were so <u>minute</u> we found them easier to see under a microscope. 2) Wait a <u>minute</u>! Our classes are 41 <u>minutes</u> long (not counting passing time).

# 21 immense (adj) extremely large, huge, gigantic (\u2264 minute)

An ocean is an **immense** body of water.

# 22 **lethargic** (adj) slow-moving, sluggish, lacking energy (# energetic) A hot, humid day makes most people feel **lethargic**.

- # 23 rancid (adj) stale, spoiled, rotten (food, not children!) (= fresh)
  I almost gagged when I discovered mold on the rancid cottage cheese.
- # 24 **irate** (adj) extremely angry, furious

  My mother was <u>irate</u> when she realized the spilled nail polish remover had eaten away the paint on the hood of her beautiful new car.
- # 25 **belligerent** (adj) fond of fighting; at war ( peace-loving, neutral)

  1) The **belligerent** neighborhood gang fought against rival gangs, beat up "weaklings" on our block, and fought against each other when there was nothing better to do.

  2) Great Britain and Germany were **belligerent** countries

during World War II.

# 26 dilapidated (adj) run down, neglected (\neq well cared for)

To save money, the couple bought a dilapidated house which they thought they could fix up together.

# 27 lean (adj) not fat; slender, slim († chubby, plump)

My doctor recommended eating lean meat as a way of keeping my cholesterol level low.

Modeling agencies hire girls with lean bodies to be fashion models.

# 28 placid (adj) calm, peaceful ( distressed, agitated, upset)

The surface of the placid lake looked like a mirror.

Placid babies are easy to care for because they rarely cry or act upset.

# 29 **replenish** (verb) to refill (\neq to use up, to empty)
We need to **replenish** our supply of cookies; I just ate the last ones.

# 30 **trepidation** (noun) fright, the feeling of fear
The snarling, lunging dogs filled me with **trepidation**as I rode my bike past them on my way to school.

#31 feline (noun & adj) (1) a cat, member of the cat family; (2) catlike

1. Tigers, lions, cheetahs, pumas and panthers live in the **Feline House** in the zoo.

2. Some people say that Sophia Lauren has **feline** eyes.

# 32 **immaculate** (adj) perfectly clean, spotless ( $\neq$  filthy, messy)

The campers were told to make their bunk look **immaculate** to pass inspection.

# 33 **succinct** (adj) brief, to the point ( long-winded, rambling, wordy) We always make our telephone conversations **succinct** to save on long-distance charges.

# 34 flaw (noun) (1) a mistake, blemish or imperfection

(2) <u>flawless</u> (adj) perfect

1. If a diamond has a **flaw**, it is less valuable than a perfect one.

2. Skaters earn a score of ten for a <u>flawless</u> performance.

# 35 dense (adj) (1) very thick, packed tightly together ( $\neq$  sparse) (2) slang - stupid, thick-headed

1. Crowded cities have very <u>dense</u> populations.

2. The <u>dense</u> looks of the students showed they did not understand at all.

# 36 **agile** (adj) able to move quickly with ease and grace (an agile dancer, athlete, animal) (\neq awkward, clumsy) The **agile** cat-burglar climbed over roof tops into open windows without making a sound.

# 37 **berserk** (adj) insane, crazy (describes a person or animal) (‡ sane)
The man who pushed a young woman to her death in
front of a subway train must have been **berserk**.

# 38 **superfluous** (adj) extra, more than enough (insufficient)

My mother always prepares a **superfluous** amount of food for parties and then wonders what to do with the leftovers.

# 39 indolent (adj) lazy (# hard-working, ambitious)

The <u>indolent</u> housekeeper was fired for lying on the couch, eating chips and watching game shows all afternoon.

# 40 sparse (adj) scanty, widely spaced, thinly populated (=/dense) (sparse hair, vegetation, population)

The population in wilderness areas is very **sparse**.

# 41 tardy (adj) late (∮early)

When I was stuck in traffic on Northern Boulevard at 5:30 PM and I had a 5:45 PM appointment at North Middle School, I feared I would be <u>tardy</u> for the meeting.

# 42 emaciated (adj) extremely thin, skinny, bony ( obese, very fat)
